Reflections From the Pastor

*Each year you give us this joyful season
when we prepare to celebrate the paschal mystery
with mind and heart renewed.
- Lenten Eucharistic Preface*

I've always been struck by these words found in the Preface of the Mass. Quite honestly, my background has taught me that Lent is about being more on the miserable side than the joyful side. After all, we are supposed to do penance, abstaining from meat, fasting between meals, giving of alms, etc. I've often joked that the reason I have bad knees is because in the high school seminary, I spent so much time on my knees doing penance (you see, I wasn't exactly a "saintly" student).

So the question now becomes what does the church mean in speaking of Lent as this joyful time, and in what sense can we say that Lent is joyful? I think the key is found in the notion of the paschal mystery of Christ's suffering, dying, and rising. This mystery is about the fact that the Lord God sees in each and every one of us something of value, something worth redeeming. It is for that reason that He has sent His son.

Lent offers one an opportunity to look at oneself in a different way; to look at oneself as God does. Meaning that I am challenged to discover in my being what God sees is worth redeeming. In fact, this is why we call the Word of God good news. That despite our sinfulness, God always sees something in us that is good and holy.

I am reminded of the words found in the Holy Torah where the Lord God says to His people "Be holy as I, your God, am holy." Once again, holiness begins in God Himself and in our ability to look at ourselves and others the way God sees us. So often it is easier to focus on the negative, to beat one's breast with endless "*mea culpas*." In doing so, to become more centered on self than on God.

This Lent I would like to challenge all of us to truly make this a joyful season. The season where I see the practices of Lent, whether fasting or abstaining, or the giving of the alms, as something I do joyfully and willingly. I fast not so much to deny myself as to provide for others what I have and they do not have, and so the giving of alms is a way of providing to others some of the blessings that I have received and for being an instrument of God's blessings. A little time on the knees doesn't necessarily hurt, even for us who have arthritis, for there are many who live constantly in pain and perhaps my little brief moment of pain helps me to be in solidarity with those who suffer much greater pain.

I would like to invite everyone to join with me this joyful coming Friday, February 19, in a Day of Prayer as a way of placing ourselves into the spirit of Lent. There will be all-day Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament as well as different opportunities for the Sacrament of Reconciliation (12:00 noon, 4:30 PM and 6:30 PM). Most of all to just treat yourself to taking time for silent prayer in the spirit of the Sabbath, resting in the Lord, and perhaps in that quiet of resting in God to discover all the good things that God has done in and through you.

And I pray that all of us have a joyful and delightful Lent.

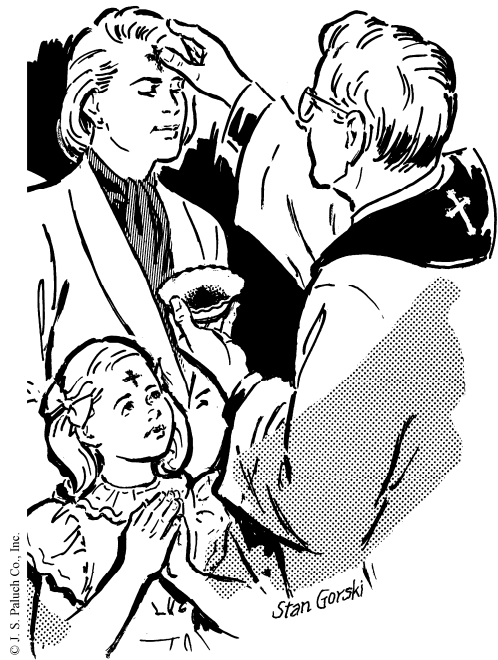
As Lent approaches next Wednesday, I am reminded of a story. Jack Shea, author and speaker, has written a wonderful, modern version of the Stations of the Cross. In the sixth station, *Veronica Wipes the Face of Jesus*, an 8 year old girl in play clothes speaks: Everyone calls me Ronnie, except my mother. She calls me Veronica. I'm named after the lady who wiped Jesus' face with her veil. My teacher says her name means "true image" because Jesus left a picture of his face on her veil.

When I was small, my mother would wipe my face with a washcloth and say, "Now there's the real you, your true face under all the dirt of the day." She never let me go to bed without my true face. Sometimes I would see her coming with a washcloth in the middle of the day, usually when I'd been bad. "We have to get at your true face," she would say.

I don't let her do that anymore. I told her I can do it myself. But sometimes she puts a washcloth on my bed at night or sticks one in my lunch box with an apple wrapped in it. No one at school guesses. But I know.

Each year the church provides us with a season to focus on the mystery of the heart of our faith, the Paschal mystery of the living, dying and rising of Jesus and our own living, dying and rising with Jesus. A look back at our joys and sorrows, successes and failures -- but also a look towards our future self which is more in keeping with the gospel stories. The stories of the Samaritan woman, Zacchaeus the tax collector, the woman with internal bleeding are all stories of goodness waiting to happen.

Jesus focused on possibilities. Someone once said, "forget the cracks, it's how the light gets in." That's what happened to so many of those who met Jesus. They began to see what they were meant to be, their "true face" as sons and daughters of God. It's still true today. Lent can be that time for us when we discover our "true face". ***Washcloths might help!***

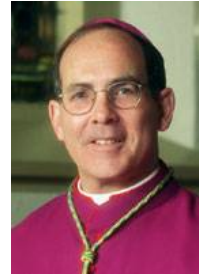

Dear Friends in Christ,

In a small village called Kapshagai in Kazakhstan, the Catholic Church supports a series of shelter-homes for children whose families face challenges too difficult to manage. The Church provides these children with shelter, food, clothing, vocational training, companionship, and love on behalf of their family members in the hope that they can resume care. What started as one building housing 20 children in 2001 has become 10 buildings today, where children and young people, including university students, receive housing and counseling.

The Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe supports essential pastoral needs of the region, such as seminary formation and parish maintenance. The Collection also helps with social and charitable works that the local Church does not have the capacity to support, such as the shelter-homes for the children of Kapshagai.

Because of the fall of communism and the entrance of many central and eastern European countries into the European Union, many think that the needs of the region have been met. However, many parishes struggle in places where Catholics are in the minority, lack proper places to worship and the ability to provide pastoral care, and most importantly, cannot support themselves. On behalf of the struggling parishes of the Church in Central and Eastern Europe, we ask for your support of the upcoming Collection. Through it, we can give faith to the future by helping the Church to grow in faith and by nurturing the Church's children.

Please be generous in your parish Collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. Stand in solidarity with your brothers and sisters across the globe in Central and Eastern Europe and parts of Asia that were once under Soviet control—where great needs remain.

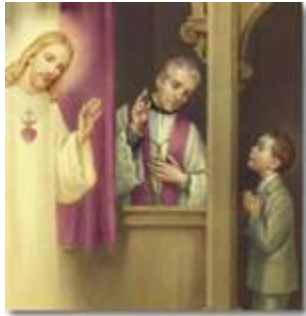

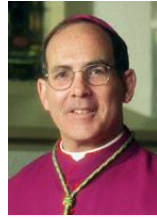

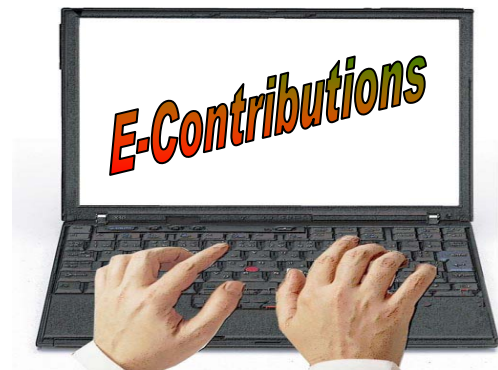
Conference for the Divorced and Widowed: Risking Faith, Achieving Joy, March 20, 2010

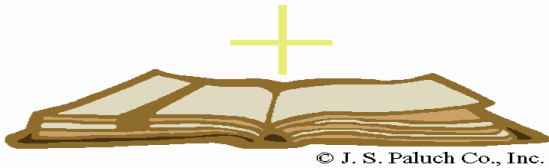
