Reflections From the Pastor

*“When the people in the synagogue heard this,
they were all filled with fury.”
- St. Luke 4:21-30*

I remember reading years ago in a college literature course Thomas Wolf’s novel, Look Homeward Angel. Thomas Wolf was a southern writer who in the novel reflects on his early childhood memories of life in a small southern town. Unfortunately, while it was fiction, many in his hometown thought they recognized themselves in this story. Consequently, the sequel to Look Homeward Angel was a second novel entitled “You Can’t Go Home.”

Consider for a moment the gospel text today from St. Luke. It begins with the people being amazed and very much impressed with the wisdom of Jesus. They are somewhat astounded that one of them should have such wisdom. Yet when Jesus goes on to speak, their amazement turns to anger. So much so that now they want to do him in.

In the Old Testament, the young prophet Jeremiah is often considered a prototype for Jesus of Nazareth. He also, like Jesus, is entrusted with a sacred mission. “As a prophet to the nations” Jeremiah says to the Lord, “I am young and I cannot speak” hoping that the Lord will reconsider his call. But the Lord says to Jeremiah, “Be still and I will place my word in your mouth so that the word you speak is not your word, but my word.”

In baptism, all of us have been anointed with chrism. That same chrism is also used in the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Orders. Chrism empowers us to be prophets. In fact, in baptismal anointing, we recall the words of Peter in his instruction to the newly baptized in which he tells them that through their baptism they share not only in the priesthood of Jesus Christ but in His prophetic ministry as well. Indeed, the title Christ, *Christos* means “anointed one.” We have been anointed by the Lord to proclaim good news. Indeed this is the text that prefaces today’s Gospel.

Consider for a moment the words of Isaiah that form the text that Jesus the Rabbi proclaims in the Gospel of Luke, “The Lord has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor and freedom to captives to give sight to the blind and to declare a year of favor from the Lord” (Luke, Chapter 4). It is interesting to note that the object of Jesus’ mission is the poor and the marginated. The text does not say to proclaim the good news to all, but rather specifies to the poor. This has come to be referred to in the social teaching of the Church as the “*fundamental option for the poor*” (Medellin 1968 and Puebla 1979).

The prophet needs to know in the words of Hebrews “that the Word of the Lord is a two-edged sword” and that there will be times when one speaks that word that the message will not be well received, even by those who profess to believe in that word. The prophet very often is a lonely solitary figure. Yet all of us by baptism are called to such a role; difficult though it may be. That is why it is important to remember the words of the Lord to Jeremiah, “Be still, for I will put my word on your tongue.”

LOVE NEVER FAILS

In the second reading today, we hear in Paul's first Letter to the Corinthians: "If I speak in human and angelic tongues, but do not have love, I am a resounding gong or clashing cymbal."

Evidences of love are found in our daily lives if we become aware. Fr. Ronald Rolheiser, speaker and writer, says it well: "After the birth of Christ, God is now found where we live – in our kitchens, at our tables, in our wounds, and in each other's faces. After the birth of Christ, we need not look to the extraordinary or the miraculous to find God. Through the incarnation God crawls into ordinary life and invites us to meet him there."

A recent article in the Tribune featured Bridge Communités, Glen Ellyn, an organization that provides services and opportunities and advocates for homeless families in our area. Bridge Communities began because two men became aware of the homeless families, including children, living in our community. When asked what prompted them to begin, their response was "That's what our spiritual life calls us to do. What do you do when you see a problem in the community? You help fix it. You try."

Globally in today's world, in our time, we have seen an extraordinary outpouring of love in the worst of times. When the attacks of 9/11 happened in New York, there was an immediate response to the tragedy both within our country and throughout the world. Then Katrina happened and people throughout our nation responded with monies and talents. And now, Haiti. It is almost impossible to comprehend the devastation, but generous hands and hearts are once again taking action. It is as St. Paul informs us, "So faith, hope, love remain, these three, but the greatest of these is love."

Love never fails.

Updates from our Pastor



FYI, you may be wondering why the nativity scene has not been removed from the Church or outside. The reason is that it is the custom in Rome and in other parts of the world to have the nativity scene until the Feast of the Presentation (February 2), which is sometimes known as Candlemas Day. On that day it is the tradition to bless candles and also children.

A second point is regarding the reception of the Eucharist at Mass. Four years ago the U.S. Bishops established a proper protocol for the reception of Communion. Bishops emphasized that because it is part of the communal worship of the Church, there should be uniformity in how we receive the Eucharist. The proper protocol is to bow the head slightly before approaching to receive either the consecrated bread or the blessed cup. *One should not genuflect or kneel.* Sometimes we forget that standing is a proper form of adoration. Kneeling, in fact, is a penitential gesture. I would ask that people reflect on how they receive the Lord in the Eucharist; to do it with reverence but I also would say that it is not necessary to kneel or genuflect before receiving, for in fact, that calls attention not so much to the Eucharist as to the person who is doing this.

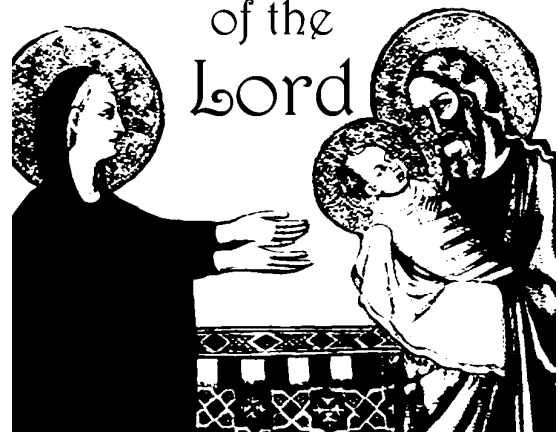

FORTALEZA ANTE LA OPOSICIÓN

Al apuntar a Jeremías para que se enfrente a la gente y anuncie la verdad, Dios le prometió al mismo tiempo que tendría la fortaleza para cumplir su cometido. “Te harán la guerra, pero no podrán contigo, porque yo estoy a tu lado para salvarte” (Jeremías 1:19).

Jesús también se enfrentó a la oposición, desde el principio. En su pueblo natal de Nazaret la gente no podía aceptar la idea de que alguno de los suyos pudiera ser el mensajero de Dios: “Se llenaron de ira”, expulsaron a Jesús del pueblo y por poco lo desbarrancan, despeñándolo. “Pero él, pasando por en medio de ellos, se alejó de allí” (Lucas 4: 28, 30).

Aunque el verdadero profeta es fortalecido por Dios, san Pablo dice que hay algo más importante que sufrir la muerte por la palabra de Dios pues “aunque me dejara quemar vivo, si no tengo amor, de nada me sirve” (1 Corintios 13:3).

SAN FELIPE DE JESÚS (1572-1597)

5 de febrero

Felipillo, como era conocido, nació en la Ciudad de México en una familia de comerciantes. Dado que su vida era un desastre, una de las africanas que cuidaba dijo que la higuera seca del patio “florecería cuando Felipillo fuera santo”. Luego de explorar la vida franciscana y huir de ella, su padre lo envió a Filipinas para que probara suerte en los negocios, pero esta vida tampoco le llenó. Ingresó nuevamente a la Orden Franciscana en Filipinas y, con el paso de los años fue enviado a México para ser ordenado sacerdote. Su barco naufragó en Japón durante un período de persecución contra los cristianos liderado por el emperador Taicosama. En su calidad de extranjero, Felipillo podía evitar el martirio, pero decidió unirse a sus compañeros franciscanos y jesuitas y sufrir con ellos la muerte por Cristo. Lo colgaron de una cruz, lo sujetaron con argollas y dos lanzas lo traspasaron. En su agonía repetía una y otra vez: “Jesús, Jesús, Jesús”, de ahí que se le venera como Felipe de Jesús. El día de su muerte, la higuera floreció.
