Reflections From the Pastor

Listen to everything, forget much, correct a little!
- Blessed Pope John XXIII

The words that appear on the cover of today's bulletin came from Pope John XXIII as he convoked the Second Vatican Council. They were words that marked a significant change in how we are Church and what Jesus calls us to be as Church. During the 50 days of Easter the Church reflecting on the Word seeks to renew and recreate herself to become the Church Christ intended. Conversion is about change and change is not always easy.

Some years ago a Brazilian educator wrote an extraordinary book that was to come to have a tremendous impact on the Catholic Church of Latin America and eventually to some degree on the Church of the United States. The title of the book is *Pedagogy of the Oppressed* and the author was Pablo Freire. It is this book that gave great impetus to the birth of small Christian communities (*comunidades de base*). Years later Pope John Paul II in his response to the Synod of the Americas affirmed the important role such communities have both in the empowerment of the poor and the oppressed and in the renewal of the Church.

At the same time Pablo Freire's book first appeared the Bishops of Latin American (*CELAM*) in response to Pope Paul VI's encyclical, *Progressio Populorum*, gathered in Medellin, Columbia (1968). The Pope opened their conference. It was at that conference that the Church formally embraced the fundamental principle called the Church's *fundamental option for the poor* which is clearly based on the gospel.

To say that all embraced this moral principle would be to ignore the history of the Americas and of the Church after Medellin. Because the Church not only stated clearly that the Church is called and foremost to serve the poor but is also called to empower the poor to be the *masters of their destiny*, the Church has come to know the meaning of taking up the Cross. The late Penny Lernoux chronicled this history in her moving and difficult book, *The Cry of the Poor*. Reading her book one comes to realize that the Church of Latin America these past 40 years has become the *Church of Martyrs*. One has seen and continues to see not only bishops and religious like Oscar Romero but many men and women as well youth who have come to shed their blood for no other reason than trying to put the gospel into practice.

There is an ancient saying of the Church, one that is both truthful and humble: *the Church is both holy and sinful*. The Church is holy because of Christ but the Church is sinful in that *we*, the Church, do not always live what we preach. I think this is why I find the words of Blessed John XXIII so powerful. There is certain irony one finds in the gospel. The irony is how people react to love and forgiveness. All too often the response to love is violence. Hence, the Cross!

Something Pablo Freire experienced in working with the poor and oppressed was that at certain point they would rebel against their liberation. Initially they would be thrilled by the idea of freedom but as they began to experience freedom they would little by little start to shy away from freedom, wanting to go back to the way things were. What happened with the new found freedom was that now one was responsible for that freedom and that caused fear. How Jesus says "*Do not be afraid!*" In educating the oppressed (pedagogy), it is critical that one helps the oppressed to trust that they can work through the fear and when they do they will know true freedom (resurrection) and while they may still be poor no one can ever oppress them or take away their dignity.

¡Escuche todo, olvídense de mucho, y corrija un poco!

Bendito Papa Juan XXIII

Las palabras que aparecieron en la portada del boletín de hoy vienen de el Papa Juan XXIII cuando el convocó el Concilio del Segundo Vaticano. Estas palabras marcaron un cambio significativo en como la Iglesia y como Jesús nos llama a ser como la Iglesia. Durante los 50 días de la pascua, la Iglesia reflexionó en la palabra y como esta quiere renovar y recrearse para ser la Iglesia de Cristo. Esta conversión esta por cambiar y los cambios no son siempre fáciles.

Hace tiempo, un educador brasileño escribió un libro extraordinario que tendría un impacto tremendo en la Iglesia Católica de Latinoamérica y eventualmente de alguna manera en la Iglesia de los Estados Unidos. El título del libro es *Pedagogía del Oprimido* y el autor es Pablo Freire. Fue este libro que dio gran fuerza al nacimiento de las comunidades pequeñas (*comunidades de base*). Después de un tiempo, el Papa Juan Pablo II afirmó en su respuesta al Sínodo de las Américas sobre la importancia de el rol de estas comunidades para capacitar al pobre, oprimido y la renovación de la Iglesia.

Al mismo tiempo el libro de Pablo Freire's apareció por primera vez en la publicación de los Obispos de Iberoamérica (CELAM) en respuesta a la encíclica de Papa Paul VI, *Progressio Populorum*, que se reunió en Medellín, Colombia (1968). El Papa abrió esta conferencia y fue en esta conferencia que la Iglesia aceptó formalmente el principio fundamental comúnmente llamado como *La opción fundamental de la Iglesia para el pobre* que es basado claramente en el evangelio.

Para decir que todos recibieron o aceptaron este principio moral sería como ignorar la historia de las Américas y de la Iglesia después de Medellín. Porque la Iglesia no sólo indicó claramente que la Iglesia es llamada para servir al pobre, pero también es llamada a capacitar al pobre para que sean los *maestros de su destino*. La Iglesia ha venido a saber el significado de tomar la Cruz. El difunto Penny Lernoux hizo la crónica de esta historia en su libro tan conmovedor llamado *Las lágrimas del Pobre*. Al leer este libro, uno se puede dar cuenta que la Iglesia de Iberoamérica se ha convertido en los últimos 40 años en la Iglesia de los Mártires. Muchos nos hemos dado cuenta que no solo obispos y religiosos como Oscar Romero, pero también muchas mujeres y hombres, como también jóvenes han derramado su sangre para poner el evangelio en práctica.

En la Iglesia hay una frase antigua, una que es verdadera y humilde: la Iglesia es Santa y Pecadora. La Iglesia es santa por Cristo, pero la Iglesia es pecadora en la que nosotros, la Iglesia, no siempre hacemos lo que predicamos. Es por eso que yo pienso que las palabras de Juan XXIII son muy poderosas. Uno puede encontrar algo de ironía en el evangelio. La ironía es cuando la gente reacciona al amor y al perdón. Con demasiada frecuencia la respuesta para adorar o amar es la violencia. ¡Transición de ahí, a la Cruz!

Algo que Pablo Freire experimentó al trabajar con el pobre y oprimido fue que en cierto momento ellos se rebelarían contra su liberación. Inicialmente, ellos estarían encantados con la idea de la libertad, pero en cuanto ellos comenzaran a experimentar la libertad, ellos poco a poco no les convencería la idea de la libertad queriendo regresar a como estaban antes. Lo que sucedió con el encuentro nuevo de la libertad es que uno era responsable de esa libertad que causaba temor. Como Jesús dijo, “ No teman! Al educar al oprimido, era crítico que uno ayudara al oprimido a confiar en que ellos podían trabajar para vencer sus temores y que cuando ellos se dieran cuenta de su libertad (resurrección) aun siendo pobres, nadie podría oprimirlos o humillarlos.

Updates from our Pastor



1. Blessed Pope John XXIII Pastoral Center – The building formerly known as the Parish Center, in the spirit on Vatican II, will be now known as the Blessed Pope John XXIII Pastoral Center. I have chosen that name because what happens in that building truly is pastoral, and I can think of no figure in the past century who better embodied the pastoral sense of the gospel than the beloved Pope John XXIII. Indeed the church has been transformed and born anew because of that spirit.

2. After much prayer and reflection, I have come to the decision that in view of no longer having the services of the Benedictines from St. Procopius, it will be necessary as of June 1, 2010 to modify our Sunday Mass schedule. I realize that for some this might be an inconvenience, but our numbers as far as priests are quickly dwindling. I ask for everyone's understanding and consideration as we go to a new Sunday Mass schedule: 8:00 AM, 10:00 AM and 11:30 AM. Please take seriously the need to pray, not only to pray for vocations but to promote vocations.

3. I would like to thank you very much for your generous response on Holy Thursday to the appeal for Haitian Relief. The Procession for the Poor at the Holy Thursday liturgy brought in \$3,800. That has been sent to Catholic Relief Services. This means that our parish has contributed almost \$14,000 in total to Haitian Relief. Monies much needed, as Haiti is the poorest country in the western hemisphere. Once again, on Good Friday, many responded generously to the collection for the Holy Land, amounting to \$1,600. It is critical at this time to realize that many Christian Palestinians are suffering greatly in Israel, many have left the Holy Land, and so this collection goes a long way in helping to support the church's work in the Holy Land and also maintains the holy sites. As you may recall

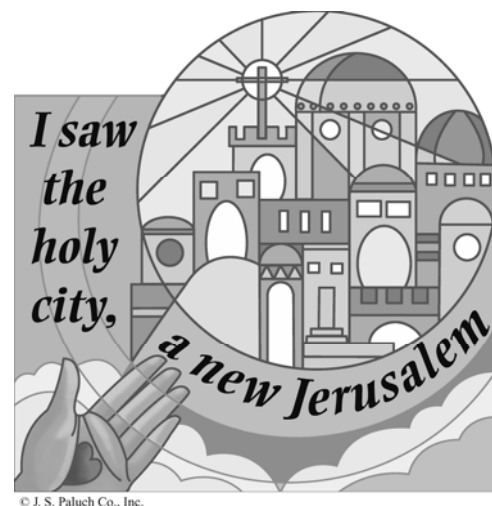
last fall I had invited Ishmael, the Palestinian from Bethlehem, to sell wood carvings from Bethlehem as a way of supporting our Christian brothers and sisters in that troubled place.

4. Possible Parish Festival on Sunday, 7/18 – As a way of celebrating and commemorating the first Mass offered at Divine Savior 41 years ago, on July 7, the idea came that perhaps it would be good to have an outdoor festival with Mass, music, entertainment and food to celebrate the Divine Savior community. In today’s Gospel, we hear Jesus issuing a new commandment to his disciples: “Love one another as I have loved you. . .this is how all will know that you are my disciples.” This was a tough assignment – to love as Jesus loved them. It was a challenge for them certainly, and a challenge for us as followers of Christ. One of the graces of my years of ministry in the church (which focused on the development of small church communities) is that I have met some of today’s disciples that take on that challenge.

In Milwaukee, there was a couple I met raising teenagers, after their own children were grown and he was retired. A single mother in their community was dying with cancer and wondered what would become of her children. The couple prayed and decided that they would raise her two boys...and they did just that.

Another was a young woman from Chicago that I met, who worked with the homeless. I remember saying, “that has to be a difficult job”. She replied, “Sometimes, but the homeless keep calling me out of my situation to their situation.”

And then, there was a man in Joliet, who lost his job and his community supported him until he found work. He then looked around and saw others who were jobless, like he had been, and he began a soup kitchen in his local parish. Other churches joined his efforts, and meals were offered nightly at various church locations. The “Shepherd’s Table” was born.

More recently, walking into Home Depot with my visible fractured arm, a young woman, very handicapped and with her caregiver, was exiting the store. As she came near to me, she looked at me and simply said, “God bless your journey.”

In large and small ways, today’s disciples are in our world and living that message “Love One another as I have loved you”. Thank God for their lives of blessing. . .

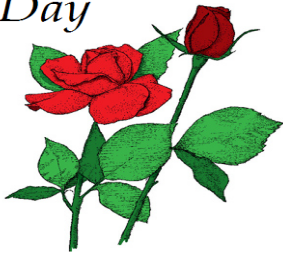

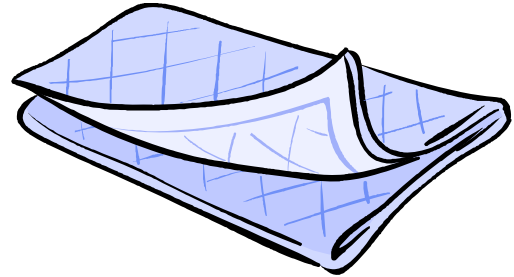
Cards for a Cause

From the Prayer Blanket Ministry

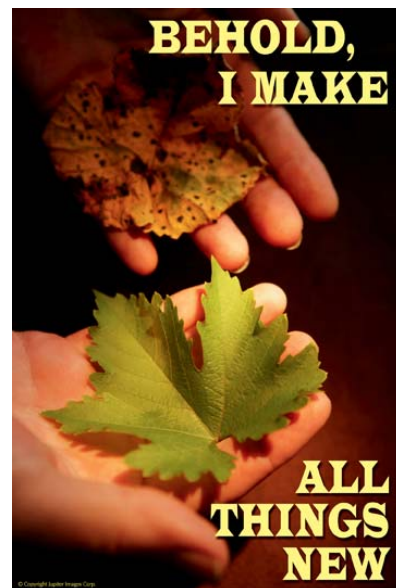

Shelter them from feelings of rejection. Protect them from discouragement. Give them courage to overcome fear.

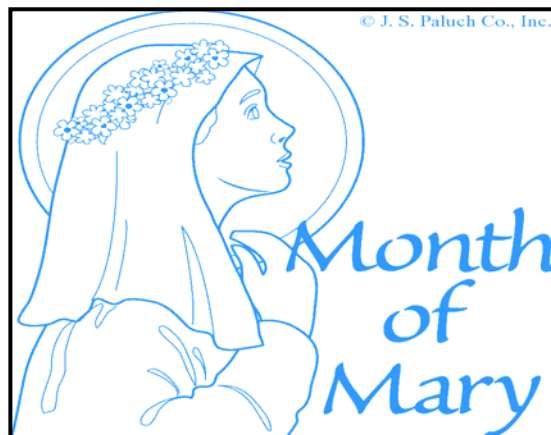
Shower on them the graces they need to persevere. Let this time of searching become an opportunity to grow in faith, to cultivate the virtue of hope and to experience Your healing love.

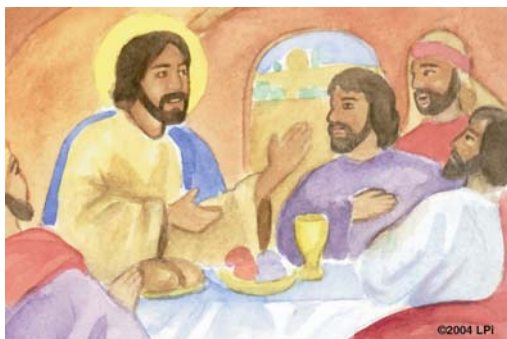
