Reflections From the Pastor

“God liturgy requires mindful celebration.”

J. Michael Joncas

There is always a danger in reciting prayers from memory. After a while the words simply come out with no thought to what is being said. Perhaps it is for this reason that the new Roman Missal to be used at the liturgy is good. It definitely will challenge one to be more attentive to the prayer.

An important part of the Mass is the celebration of the Eucharistic prayer. While there are a number of different Eucharistic prayers that may be used, all of them share a common structure. I think in the spirit of “*mindful celebration*,” it might be good to attend to the various elements that structure this prayer of the Church.

First, one needs to be mindful of the *Trinitarian Mystery* that structures the prayer. The prayer is addressed to the Father. The Church joins with Christ, the High Priest, in offering to the Father the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. By the gift of the Holy Spirit invoked in the prayer, Christ is made present, body, soul and divinity.

Elements of the Eucharistic Prayer:

1. The *Preface* which begins with a dialogue (sung) between the presider and the assembly. While there is a variety of prefaces according to seasons and feasts, the focus is giving thanks to the Father through Christ.
2. *Acclamations*: Sanctus (Holy, Holy), Memorial Acclamation (Paschal Mystery), Doxology (Great Amen). Acclamations are usually sung.
3. *Epiclesis*: Invoking the Holy Spirit to make holy what is offered (Bread and Wine) and to bring unity (communion) among those sharing in the Eucharist (the Church).
4. *Institutional Narrative and Consecration*: A recalling of the Passover Meal, the Last Supper, and the retelling of what Jesus said at the meal. The command to “*Do this in memory of Me*” whenever you gather in my name - eat *the Bread*, drink *the Cup*, the *Body and Blood of Christ*.
5. *Anamnesis*: Remembering of the mystery celebrated: the *Paschal Mystery*.
6. *Oblation*: At the heart of the prayer is the *offering* of Christ, the unblemished Lamb, and of ourselves joined with Christ to the Father in the Holy Spirit.
7. *Intercession*: Because what is celebrated and what is offered is done by the whole Church, living and dead, we pray for the needs of the whole Church.
8. *Concluding Doxology*: The word *doxology* means *praise*. This doxology brings to a climax what is celebrated and offered to the Father in the Eucharist. The assembly responds to this third acclamation with the *Great Amen*, an affirmation of all that has taken place in and through this great prayer of the Church.

As one looks at the structure of the Eucharistic Prayer and the various elements that comprise the structure, one sees clearly how well the prayer engages not only the celebrant but also the assembly. More importantly, one sees that the Church through this prayer participated actively in the very life of the Trinity.

One also can see that there is a rhythm and cadence to the great Prayer of the Eucharist that is underscored through the use of music. One needs to remember as one can see from the structure of the Eucharistic Prayer that there are different styles of music employed in the Church’s liturgy: dialogue, acclamation, litany, hymnody, etc. Because the liturgy is the prayer of the Church, it is required that the music used enables the *full and active participation* of all in the prayer.

"Liturgia de Dios requiere la celebración consciente."

Siempre hay un peligro en la recitación de oraciones de memoria. Después de un tiempo las palabras simplemente salen sin pensar en lo que se dice. Quizás es por esta razón que el nuevo Misal Romano para ser utilizado en la liturgia es bueno. Que sin duda pondrá a prueba uno a estar más atentos a la oración.

Una parte importante de la Misa es la celebración de la oración eucarística. Si bien hay un número de diferentes plegarias eucarísticas que se pueden utilizar, todos ellos comparten una estructura común. Creo en el espíritu de "celebración consciente", que podría ser bueno para atender a los distintos elementos que estructuran esta oración de la Iglesia.

En primer lugar, hay que tener en cuenta el misterio trinitario que las estructuras de la oración. La oración se dirige al Padre. La Iglesia se une con Cristo, el Sumo Sacerdote, al ofrecer al Padre el sacrificio de alabanza y acción de gracias. Por el don del Espíritu Santo invocado en la oración, Cristo se hace presente en cuerpo, alma y divinidad.

Elementos de la Plegaria Eucarística:

- 1) El prólogo que comienza con un diálogo (cantado) entre el celebrante y la asamblea. Si bien existe una gran variedad de prefacios según las estaciones y las fiestas, el objetivo es dar gracias al Padre por Cristo.
- 2) aclamaciones: Sanctus (Santo, Santo), Aclamación (misterio pascual), Doxología (Amén). Aclamaciones suelen ser cantados.
- 3) Epiclesis: Invocación al Espíritu Santo que santifica lo que se ofrece (pan y vino) y para traer la unidad (la comunión) entre los que la participación en la Eucaristía (la Iglesia).
- 4) Narrativa Institucional y Consagración: Un recuerdo de la Cena de Pascua, la Última Cena, y el recuento de lo que Jesús dijo en la comida. El mandato de "haced esto en memoria mía" cada vez que se reúnen en mi nombre - comer el pan, beber de la copa, el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo.
- 5) Anamnesis: Recuerdo del misterio que se celebra: el Misterio Pascual.
- 6) Oblación: En el corazón de la oración es la ofrenda de Cristo, el Cordero sin mancha, y de nosotros mismos unido a Cristo al Padre en el Espíritu Santo.
- 7) Intercesión: Porque lo que se celebra y lo que se ofrece se hace por toda la Iglesia que viven, y los muertos, te pedimos por las necesidades de toda la Iglesia.
- 8) finales Doxología: La palabra doxología significa alabanza. Esta doxología lleva a un clímax que se celebra y se ofreció al Padre en la Eucaristía. La asamblea responde a esta aclamación tercero con el Amén Grande, una afirmación de todo lo que ha tenido lugar en ya través de esta gran oración de la Iglesia.

Cuando uno mira la estructura de la plegaria eucarística y los distintos elementos que componen la estructura, se ve claramente lo bien que la oración se involucra no sólo el celebrante sino también de la Asamblea. Más importante aún, se ve que la Iglesia a través de esta oración, participó activamente en la vida misma de la Trinidad.

También se puede ver que hay un ritmo y cadencia a la gran oración de la Eucaristía, que se pone de relieve a través del uso de la música. Hay que recordar como se puede ver en la estructura de la Plegaria Eucarística que hay diferentes estilos de la música empleada en la liturgia de la Iglesia: el diálogo, la aclamación, letanía, himnos, etc Debido a que la liturgia es la oración de la Iglesia, es requiere que la música utilizada permite la participación plena y activa de todos en la oración.

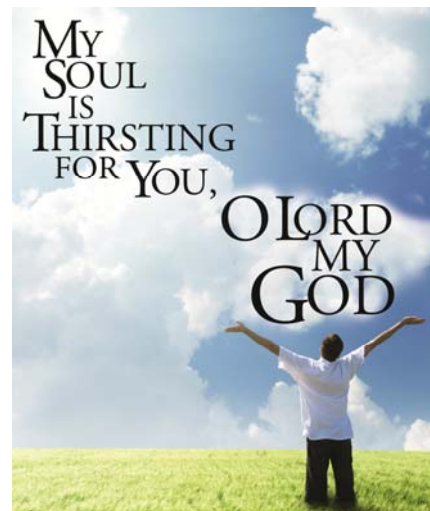
2nd Grade Mass

Divine Savior Space Usage Study

The parish Buildings and Grounds Committee conducted a space usage study of our three buildings; all were constructed in the 1970's and 1980's. Since the construction, we have made no major building changes to accommodate changing church activities. The purpose of the study was to:

- understand the current use of parish meeting spaces (class rooms and conference rooms);
- identify the challenges that exist; and,
- develop suggestions to address the challenges.

Only parish employees and members helped with the study and the parish incurred no cost.

Space:

Meeting rooms, offices, and storage space are extremely limited at the parish. Classrooms and space for meetings from small groups up to 200 participants are occasionally not available at requested times. The parish staff optimizes the space by applying their creativity and working well with each other. Recently, we added the rectory basement as small-group meeting space,

Staff offices exist in both the church building and the pastoral center. Some are crowded and arranged in ways that impair proper heating and cooling.

Storage areas exist in each building; staff generally store tools and equipment where they use it the most.

Condition:

The Pastoral Center movable walls are aging and wearing out; within a few years repairs might no longer be practical. Parish employees frequently reconfigure the walls to accommodate requests of parish groups. This effort uses significant staff time and labor.

For the next school year, the staff plans to lessen the reconfiguration of the walls. They will configure the parquet floor area (rooms D & H) as one large room. They will configure the other spaces as single classrooms. As envisioned, Religious Formations will use the single classrooms. This allows staff to schedule other groups into the parquet floor, D & H, room outside of class times without reconfiguring. While this minimizes the time, expense, and wear associated with moving the walls, it will not totally eliminate reconfigurations.

Groups use both the church basement and the rectory basement meeting rooms. The church basement meeting space is generally cold due to the location of the building's fresh air intake. This is not attractive to some groups. Groups must use stairs to reach both of these basement spaces. Reliance on stairs limits access for some group members and limits the usefulness of these spaces. The existing spaces currently meet the needs of all groups although Adult Formations has the greatest challenge finding rooms for outside speakers. In scheduling a speaker/event on Wednesday and Thursday evening (often dependent on the speaker's schedule), that event has to be scheduled in the Church because of Religious Formation classes held those evenings. Thus far it has worked out.

Next steps:

Continue to make minor changes and creative adjustments.

Define specific groups or functions for which parish employees will seek space outside the parish. This can include other parishes or not-for-profit organizations as well as rented meeting space.

Begin a structured process to evaluate the long-term need for meeting, office, and other spaces and to answer such questions as:

- Are parish activities likely to grow, shrink, or remain the same?
- What future meetings, classes, or groups might create a need for more or different space?

This might require outside help and incur expense, but then the parish can determine the need for specific new space.
