Reflections From the Pastor

*It can never be forgotten that the divine Word,
read and proclaimed by the Church, has as its one purpose
the sacrifice of the new covenant and the banquet of grace,
that is the Eucharist.*

- Order of Readings for Mass #10

Pope Benedict in *Verbum Domini* dedicates attention to the role of God's Word in the liturgy and the importance of appreciating how that Word informs and gives meaning to the Church's prayer, the sacred liturgy. He states: "*From Scripture the liturgical actions and signs draw their meaning (52)*". An important consideration for understanding the new Roman Missal for the Catholic Mass and changes made in the language of the prayers is the desire to make clearer the biblical foundation of the Eucharist.

As already seen in the instruction on the *Order of Readings* there is an important connection between the Word and the Eucharist. Pope Benedict recalls the Easter story of the *disciples on the road to Emmaus*. Returning from Jerusalem after the death of their leader, the Rabbi from Nazareth, they encounter a stranger who joins them in their journey home. Along the way the stranger asks why they are so sad and forlorn. They are astonished at the question, but the stranger proceeds talking with them about what the Scriptures have to say about their fallen leader. Arriving at Emmaus because evening is drawing close, the disciples invite the stranger into their house to break bread with them (hospitality). The stranger takes the bread, blesses it, and breaks it and in so doing the disciples come to recognize in the very breaking of the bread that the stranger is the Lord Jesus. It is in the breaking of the bread that now they come to understand the Scriptures that he had shared with them.

The Holy Father states: "*Unless we acknowledge the Lord's real presence in the Eucharist, our understanding of Scripture remains imperfect (55)*". The story of Emmaus models well the relationship of the liturgy of the Word with the liturgy of the Eucharist. And what binds them together is the *mystery of the Incarnation* – "*the Word became flesh!*". It is because of this that the dogmatic *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* (Vatican II) speaks of not only experiencing a communion with the Lord in the Eucharist but also in the proclamation of the Word (liturgy of the Word).

Reflecting on my 33 years of celebrating the Mass, I more convinced than ever of the importance and need for liturgical renewal – a liturgical renewal that can come only with a deeper reverence for God's Word. In the recent parish mission, Fr. Hutmacher made a valuable point about coming to the Table of the Lord at Eucharist. One does not come to receive. One comes to give and to offer thanksgiving to God. It is what *we*, as a priestly people, do with and in Christ, the High Priest.

I think a mistake often made owing to a lack of understanding is to approach the liturgy with a consumer mentality. How often one hears the complaint "*I get nothing out of going to Mass*" or "*I go to this Mass or avoid this Mass because I like or do not like the music*", and then one hears "*I like Fr. So and So's Mass because he tells good stories and gets us out in 40 minutes*". Notice in this where the emphasis is placed – it's all about me and what I want. Christ seems to be secondary. For me as the celebrant of the liturgy, the words of St. Paul are very important to keep in mind, "*I must decrease so that Christ may increase*". My role as presider is to lead God's holy people more deeply into the mystery of His loving presence in Word and Sacrament.

Nunca se puede olvidar que la Palabra divina,
leer y proclamada por la Iglesia, tiene como uno de los objetivos

- Ordenación de las Lecturas de la Misa # 10

Papa Benedicto XVI en Verbum Domini atención dedica al papel de la Palabra de Dios en la liturgia y la importancia de apreciar la forma en que Word en formas y da sentido a la oración de la Iglesia, la liturgia sagrada. Dice: "A partir de las Escrituras las acciones litúrgicas y los signos dibujar su significado (52)". Una consideración importante para entender el nuevo Misal romano de la misa católica y los cambios realizados en el lenguaje de la oración es el deseo de hacer más claro el fundamento bíblico de la Eucaristía.

Como ya se ha visto en las instrucciones de la Ordenación de las Lecturas existe una importante relación entre la Palabra y la Eucaristía. Papa Benedicto XVI recuerda la historia de la Pascua de los discípulos en el camino a Emaús. Al volver de Jerusalén después de la muerte de su líder, el rabino de Nazaret, se encuentran con un extraño que les une en su viaje a casa. En el camino el desconocido le pregunta por qué son tan triste y desolado. Ellos están asombrados de la cuestión, sino el producto extraño hablar con ellos acerca de lo que las Escrituras tienen que decir acerca de su líder caído. Al llegar a Emaús, porque la noche está llegando cerca, los discípulos invitan al forastero a su casa para partir el pan con ellos (hospitalidad). El desconocido se toma el pan, lo bendice y lo parte y, al hacerlo, los discípulos llegado a reconocer en la fracción muy del pan que el extraño es el Señor Jesús. Es en la fracción del pan, que ahora llegan a comprender las Escrituras que había compartido con ellos.

El Santo Padre dice: "A menos que reconocer la presencia real del Señor en la Eucaristía, nuestra comprensión de la Escritura sigue siendo imperfecta (55)". La historia de los modelos de Emaús y la relación de la liturgia de la Palabra en la liturgia de la Eucaristía. Y lo que los une es el misterio de la Encarnación - "el Verbo se hizo carne!". Es por ello que la Constitución dogmática sobre la Sagrada Liturgia (Vaticano II) habla no sólo de experimentar una comunión con el Señor en la Eucaristía, sino también en la proclamación de la Palabra (la liturgia de la Palabra).

Reflexionando sobre mis 33 años de la celebración de la misa, yo más convencido que nunca de la importancia y necesidad de la renovación litúrgica - la renovación litúrgica que sólo puede venir con una reverencia más profunda para la Palabra de Dios. En la reciente misión de la parroquia, el Padre. Hutmacher hizo un valioso punto de venir a la mesa del Señor en la Eucaristía. Uno no llega a recibir. Uno trata de dar y ofrecer a la acción de gracias a Dios. Es lo que nosotros, como pueblo sacerdotal, hacer con y en Cristo, el Sumo Sacerdote.

Creo que un error frecuente, debido a la falta de entendimiento es acercarse a la liturgia con la mentalidad de los consumidores. ¿Con qué frecuencia se oye la queja "que salga nada de ir a misa" o "voy a esta Misa o evitar esta misa porque me gusta o no le gusta la música", y luego se escucha "me gusta el Padre. Así y Así es la misa, porque le dice a las buenas historias y nos lleva en 40 minutos ". Note que en este donde el énfasis se coloca - es todo sobre mí y lo que quiero. Cristo parece ser secundario. Para mí, como el celebrante de la liturgia, las palabras de St. Paul son muy importantes a tener en cuenta, "yo disminuya para que Cristo puede aumentar". Mi papel como celebrante es conducir pueblo santo de Dios más profundamente en el misterio de su presencia amorosa en la Palabra y los Sacramentos.

Empowering Communication: Essential Skills for Clergy and Lay, Long Term and Interim Ministries Friday April 15, 2011

Empowering Communication (EC), also known as Nonviolent Communication, can help religious leaders minister with respect, caring and compassion -- nutrients that allow congregations to flourish. Embodying EC consciousness in meetings can create inclusion and inspire all members to work for the well being of the whole organization. Individuals will learn a model to address and resolve conflict within the congregation and in all relationships. EC provides a model to transform judgment into compassion and to live out unconditional love.

–Teach practical ways to live out spiritual values –Listen with your heart to what others are and are not saying

People of many faith traditions have found EC in harmony with their practices. Here are words from a seminary professor: "I have found Nonviolent Communication to be a humanizing spiritual practice, beautiful in its simplicity and in its potential to transform misunderstanding and conflict into opportunities for mutual growth. I believe that it is consonant with the teachings of Jesus and a source of practical wisdom for communities of faith, especially those that have been torn apart by vitriolic discourse. For these reasons and more, I teach it regularly in my seminary courses and recommend it highly to church leaders." ~ Rev. Dr. Theresa F. Latini, Assistant Professor of Congregational and Community Care, Luther Seminary, Saint Paul MN.

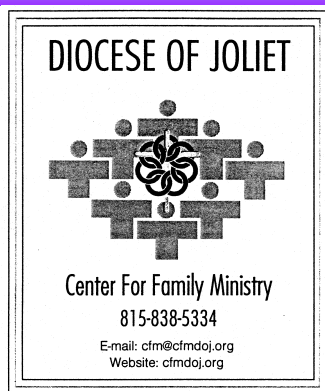

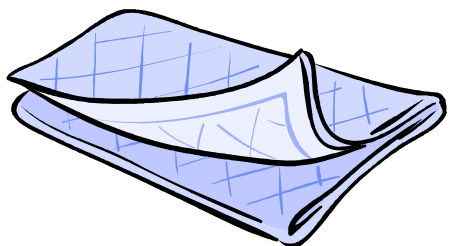

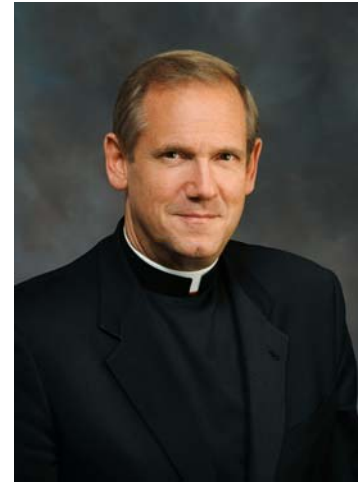
THIRD SUNDAY BOOK DISCUSSION

Monsignor Kenneth Velo, a priest of the Archdiocese of Chicago, serves as Senior Executive of Catholic Collaboration for DePaul University and as President of the Big Shoulders Fund.

Monsignor was ordained in 1973 and appointed to St. Angela Parish in Chicago. In 1980, he was appointed to the Archdiocesan Pastoral Center. In the following years he served in various administrative positions, including vice chancellor of the Archdiocese and executive assistant to Joseph Cardinal Bernardin. In November 1993, Monsignor Velo was named president of the Catholic Church Extension Society, a national organization which raises funds and awareness for Mission dioceses in the United States. In March of 1996, he was named Prelate of Honor of His Holiness with the title of Monsignor. In 2001, he began his responsibilities at DePaul University. At DePaul Monsignor helps to extend the services of the university to the Catholic community and other entities.

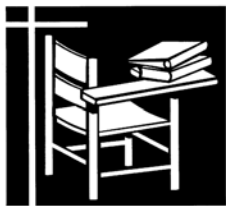

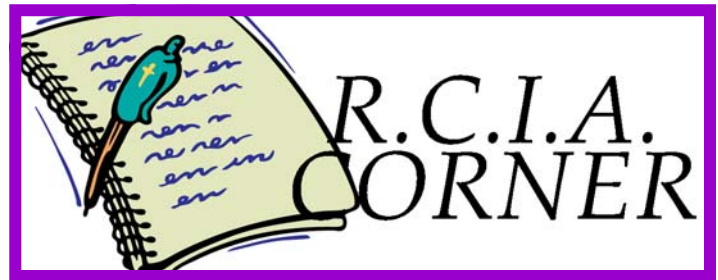

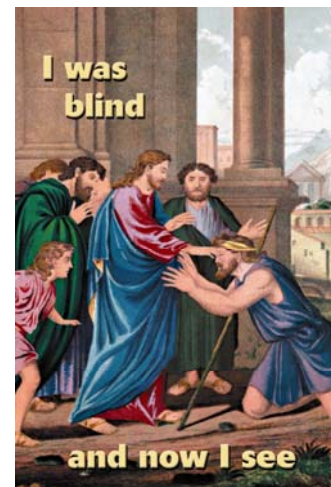
