## *Reflections From the Pastor*

*“I am the bread of life;  
whoever comes to me will never hunger,  
and whoever believes in me will never thirst.”*

**John 6:35**

It bears repeating once again the teaching of the Church that it is in *gathering* at the Lord’s Table for Eucharist that we are truly *Church*. The very heart and soul of the Christian life is the celebration of the Eucharist. Yet, this is what sadly separates Western Christians, Protestant from Catholic-Orthodox. However, it is also this belief that challenges all of us to work for Christian unity.

One remembers the words of Jesus “*Do this in memory of Me*” and yet each Sunday Christians gather in different churches, each doing their own thing. Think about the number of Christian churches in Downers Grove. Do you ever wonder why Lutherans go their way and Methodists go another way, Evangelicals do their thing and Presbyterians something else. Meanwhile Catholics and Orthodox celebrate the *Divine Liturgy*. Somehow and for some reason things are very much out of sync!

Now this business of going our own way and doing our own thing does not mean that Catholics, Protestants, and Orthodox are sitting on their hands doing nothing. Over the last century some very important things have happened to bring about Christian unity. For over 40 years Catholics and Lutherans have had serious dialogues on Eucharist, Holy Orders and the doctrine of Justification. Ten years ago on Reformation Sunday, October 30<sup>th</sup>, Lutherans and Catholics gathered in Augsburg to sign an agreement on the doctrine of justification (faith – works), ending 400 years of strife and bitterness. For some this agreement marked the end of the Reformation. Interestingly, it was Cardinal Ratzinger, now Benedict XVI, who played an important role in making sure this day came about, this historic step toward Christian unity.

Another splendid example of Christians working toward Christian unity is the movement of Taize. A number of years ago a group of Protestants and Catholics came together in Taize, France, forming a monastic community dedicated to promoting Christian unity and peace. Through the years thousands of young people, and not so young, have journeyed to Taize to experience this wonderful community and then return to share with their own communities what they experienced.

Today many churches, Catholic and Protestant, gather to celebrate what has come to be known as *Taize Prayer*. The service is grounded in the Word. The music has the simplicity of Gregorian chant and is sung in various languages. I periodically attend on First Friday the Taize service held at Ascension Catholic Church in Oak Park. The service begins at 7:30 p.m. and lasts no more than an hour. I have found gathering with others for this prayer personally enriching and energizing. It is a wonderful example of the power of prayer in an ecumenical setting and a sign of hope that one day we will all gather not only at the table of God’s Word but also the table of the Eucharist.

As I reflect and pray on these texts of the Gospel of John (Chapter 6), I have come to see that they not only speak to the Christian reality of the Eucharist, but they also remind us of our Jewish roots. Indeed, it is difficult to appreciate the profound richness of the Eucharist and liturgy without taking in to account the *Jewishness* of Jesus. Just as one cannot understand or appreciate the New Testament apart from the Old Testament, so one cannot fathom the meaning of the Eucharist apart from its Jewish roots. In fact, the great division within the Western Church over the Eucharist is owing in part to our forgetting from whence we come. Pope Pius XI once stated that all Christians are *spiritual Semites* – a bold statement on the eve of the Nazi era!

Yo soy el pan de vida;  
El que viene a mí no tendrá hambre, y el que cree en mí nunca tendrá sed.

Vale la pena repetir una vez más la enseñanza de la Iglesia que está en la recolección en la Mesa del Señor Eucaristía para que en verdad somos una Iglesia. El corazón y el alma de los Cristianos viven en la celebración de la Eucaristía. Sin embargo, esto es lo que separa tristemente cristianos occidentales, protestantes de católicos y ortodoxos. Sin embargo, también el desafío y la creencia es de todos nosotros para trabajar por la unidad cristiana.

Uno recuerda las palabras de Jesús: "Haced esto en memoria mía" y sin embargo, cada Domingo cristianos se reúnen en diferentes iglesias, cada uno por su lado. Piense en el número de iglesias cristianas en Downers Grove. ¿Alguna vez se preguntan por qué los Luteranos van por su camino y los Metodistas busca otro camino, Evangelistas hacen sus cosas y los Presbiterianos algo más. Mientras tanto, los católicos y los ortodoxos celebran la Divina Liturgia. Por algo y por alguna razón las cosas están fuera de sincronía mucho!

Ahora bien, este negocio de ganado a nuestro favor y hacer lo nuestro ganado no significa que los católicos, protestantes y ortodoxos están de brazos cruzados sin hacer nada. Durante el siglo pasado algunas cosas muy importantes han sucedido a lograr la unidad cristiana. Desde hace más de 40 años y Católicos Luteranos han tenido diálogos serios sobre la Eucaristía, el Orden y la doctrina de la Justificación. Diez años atrás, el Domingo de la Reforma, luteranos y católicos 30 de octubre se reunieron en Augsburg a firmar y un acuerdo sobre la doctrina de la justificación (fe-obras), poniendo fin a 400 años de lucha y de la vida y la amargura. Para algunos este acuerdo marcó el final de la Reforma. Es interesante, era el cardenal Ratzinger, ahora Benedict XVI, quien jugó un papel tan importante en la toma y se aseguro de que este día se produjo, este paso histórico hacia la unidad cristiana.

Otro magnífico ejemplo de los cristianos que trabajan hacia la unidad de los cristianos es el movimiento de Taizé. Hace un años atrás un grupo de protestantes y católicos se reunieron en Taizé, Francia la formación de una comunidad monástica dedicada a promover la unidad cristiana y la paz. A través de los años miles de jóvenes, y no tan jóvenes, han recorrido a Taizé para experimentar esta maravillosa comunidad y luego regresar para compartir con sus comunidades ganado lo que experimentaron

Hoy muchas iglesias, católicas y protestantes, se reúnen para celebrar lo que ha llegado a ser conocida como la Oración Taizé. El servicio se basa en la Palabra La música tiene la simplicidad del canto gregoriano y se canta en varios idiomas. Yo periódicamente asistir el primer viernes del servicio Taizé celebrada en la Ascensión Iglesia Católica en Oak Park. El servicio comienza a las 7:30 p.m. y no duran más de una hora. He encontrado reunirse con otros para esta oración personal enriquecedora y estimulante. Es un maravilloso ejemplo del poder de la oración ecuménica en un entorno y un signo de esperanza que un día todos seremos juntos no solo en la mesa de la Palabra de Dios, sino también la mesa de la Eucaristía.

Al reflexionar y orar sobre estos textos del Evangelio de Juan (apítulo 6), he llegado a ver que no sólo hablan de la realidad Cristianos de la Eucaristía, sino que también nos recuerdan nuestras raíces judías. De hecho, es difícil apreciar la profunda riqueza de la Eucaristía y la liturgia, sin tener en cuenta que el carácter judío de Jesús. Así como uno no puede entender o apreciar el Nuevo Testamento, aparte de el Antiguo Testamento, por lo que no se puede comprender el significado de la Eucaristía aparte de sus raíces judías. De hecho, la gran división con la Iglesia de Occidente sobre la Eucaristía es debido en parte a nuestro olvido de donde venimos. El Papa Pío del XI declaró todos los cristianos son semitas espiritual - una declaración en negrilla en la víspera de la era nazi!

Today’s Gospel – that “dash” – is a reminder that our time is now. . .

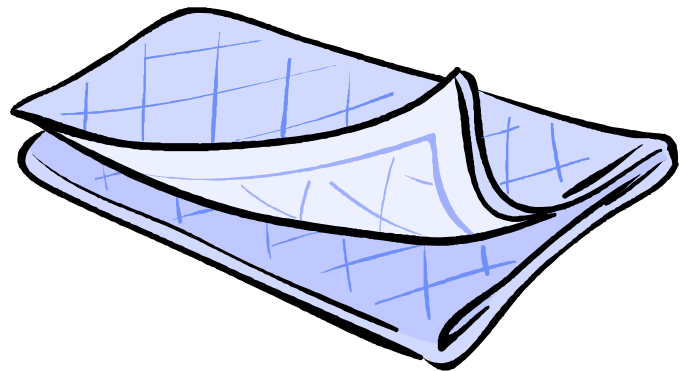

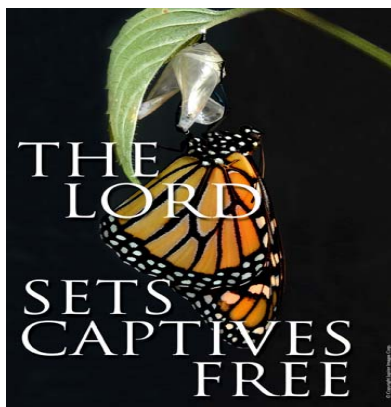
