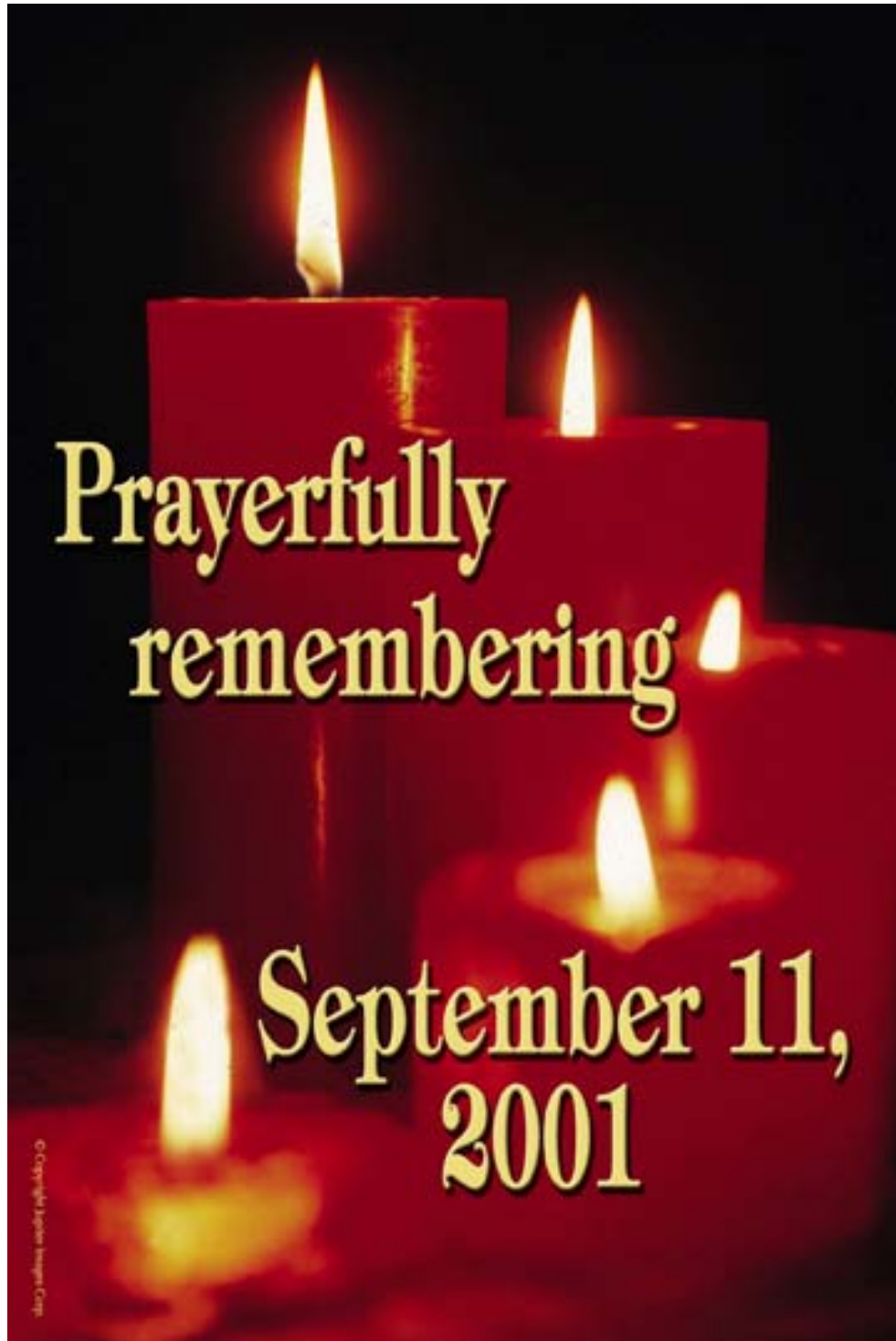

Reflections From the Pastor

Recently at a meeting with the catechists I shared with them a video on the Second Vatican Council. Watching the video I realized quickly that for many what was an event I experienced was for many of them something they read about in a book or heard about in a sermon.

I still feel the excitement generated by the good Blessed Pope John and the changes brought about by the Council. Indeed, it was like the dawning of a new spring time. The present pope, Benedict XVI, was present as a *peritus* or theological consultant to one of the leading progressive voices at the Council. In fact, he wrote an extraordinarily book that encouraged major reforms within the Church, including decentralizing authority.

Pope John XXIII was both a skilled diplomat and a very knowledgeable historian. As a priest he had taught history and served many years in the diplomatic service of the church. There is a very well known story of his rescuing a ship load of Jews from being deported back to Germany. He was at that time papal nuncio in Turkey. What the crafty Roncalli did as a ruse was issue to all on board the ship a baptismal certificate. They were all for the moment “baptized Catholics.” The trick worked and the Jews were saved.

When John addressed the opening session of the Council, he spoke of five points he saw as being critical to the success of the Council. I believe the points are important for the Church today, as well as they were for the Church in 1962. Here are the points:

1. Be filled with hope and faith. Do not be prophets of gloom.
2. Discover ways of teaching the faith more effectively.
3. Deepen the understanding of doctrine.
4. Use the medicine of mercy.
5. Seek unity within the Church, with Christians separated from Catholicism, with those of non-Christian religions and with all men and women of good will.

Reflecting on these points, one sees a man who does not fear the world but rather seeks to reach out to embrace the world. This was the first Council called not to condemn heresy or excommunicate, but rather to listen and enter into dialogue with the world. It was for this reason that Protestants, women and others were invited to be observers at the council. Never before had this happened in the Church. Indeed, it was a new day!

Sadly some of the “prophets of gloom” were within the pope’s own household, the Curia. But both God and John had a way around the prophets of gloom. When the original agenda for the Council, prepared mostly by the Curia, was proposed to the 2400 bishops from around the world, the bishops insisted the agenda be voted on. To the delight of the pope the world’s bishops rejected the agenda and mandated that each episcopal conference select a delegate to serve on the commissions for the council, preparing the new agenda. With this act the council truly became the Council of the Church Universal.

I must confess that I chuckle at this, remembering a few years ago when the Asian Bishops arrived in Rome for the Synod of Asia. Arriving the Curia presented the agenda for the synod. The Asian bishops in receiving the agenda said “no thanks” we have our own! And who said the Holy Spirit is not at work in the Church.

Recientemente en una reunión con los catequistas que he compartido con ellos un video en el Concilio Vaticano II. Viendo el video me di cuenta rápidamente que lo que para muchos fue un evento que experimenté fue para muchos de ellos something que leen en un libro o escuchado en un sermón.

Todavía siento la emoción generada por el bien beato Juan Papa y los cambios introducidos por el Consejo. De hecho, era como el amanecer de una nueva primavera.

de hecho, era como el amanecer de una nueva primavera. El Papa actual, Benedict XVI, estuvo presente como *perito* o consultor teológica de una de las voces líderes progresistas en el consejo. De hecho, él escribió un libro extraordinariamente importante que alienta las reformas dentro de la Iglesia, incluyendo la descentralización de la autoridad.

El Papa Juan XXIII era a la vez un hábil diplomático e historiador muy bien informado. Como sacerdote enseñó que tenía la historia y sirvió durante muchos años en el servicio diplomático de la iglesia. Hay una historia muy conocida de su rescate de un buque de carga de los judíos de ser deportados a Alemania. Fue en ese momento nuncio apostólico en Turquía. ¿Qué astuta Roncalli hizo lo que era un ardid particular a todos a bordo del buque un certificado de bautismo. Todos estaban por el momento "los católicos bautizados." El truco funcionó y los Judíos se salvaron.

Cuando John dirigida a la apertura de sesiones del Consejo, habló de cinco puntos que él vio como un elemento crítico para el éxito del Consejo. Creo que los puntos son importantes para la Iglesia de hoy, así como lo fueron para la Iglesia en 1962. Éstos son los puntos:

1. Se llena de esperanza y fe. No ser profetas de la oscuridad.
2. Descubre formas de enseñanza de la fe con mayor eficacia.
3. Profundizar la comprensión de la doctrina.
4. Use la medicina de la misericordia.
5. Buscar la unidad dentro de la Iglesia, con los cristianos separados del catolicismo, con las de las religiones no cristianas y con todos los hombres y mujeres de buena voluntad.

Reflectina sobre estos puntos, uno ve a un hombre que no teme el mundo, sino que más bien trata de llegar a abarcar el mundo. Este fue el primer Consejo instó a no condenar la herejía o excomunió, sino escuchar y entablar un diálogo con el mundo. Fue por esta razón que los protestantes, las mujeres y otros fueron invitados a ser observadores en el consejo. Nunca antes había sucedido esto en la Iglesia. De hecho, fue un nuevo día!

Lamentablemente algunos de los profetas "de la oscuridad" se encontraban dentro del hogar del Papa, la Curia. Pero Dios y John tenía un camino alrededor de los profetas del pesimismo. Cuando el programa original para el Consejo, preparados en su mayoría por la Curia, se propuso a la forma 2400 los obispos de todo el mundo, los obispos insistieron en el orden del día de la votación. Para el deleite del Papa los obispos del mundo rechazó la orden del día y el mandato que cada conferende elegir a la delegada episcopal para servir en las comisiones para el consejo, la preparación de la nueva agenda. Con este acto el consejo realmente se convirtió en el Consejo de la Iglesia Universal.

LOST AND FOUND

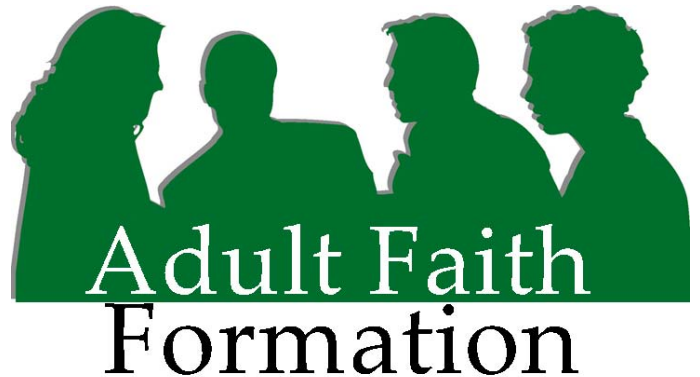
The Prodigal Son story is a story about closed and open hearts, and is a familiar Gospel story to all of us. Like all stories of any depth, however, the first or the 31st reading brings more insight. Certainly experiences in life provide a deeper understanding of the message. At different times in our life, we can connect with the elder son's response – "It isn't fair!" (A very familiar response to parents) or with the younger son's selfish motives for returning home where safety and even, forgiveness might await. Richard Rhor, O.F.M. points out that "alienation isn't the end of the world; it's the way we commonly come to God".

In the Prodigal Son story, we have a selfish son who asks for his inheritance and leaves for a distant country, and returns with a rehearsed speech. We have a father (read "God") who anxiously awaits this son's return, who runs to meet this younger son "while he was still a long way off". While the son distanced himself from the father, the father did not distance himself from his son. The prodigal son is welcomed home but expected to change. The clothing of the prodigal son in the finest robe indicates not only a fresh start but a break with his destructive past.

Then there is the elder son filled with self-righteousness and anger at the Father's planned celebration. Resentment fills his whole being. The *older dutiful brother in us* keeps all the rules but mistakenly finds his legitimacy as son in obedience rather than love. We see through the older son, that we can play by all the rules and still be lost. Each of us can be the son/daughter who is judging those who do not do life as we do.

Which reminds me. . . A long way back in time the pastor of our parish was asked to leave our congregation. Sometime after his leaving, a "good-bye" coffee was planned for any parishioners who would like to attend. I expected that there would not be many in attendance, and so I went to his leave-taking. One of the men in line with me was a

friend, but someone I didn't expect to attend. A good man, but rigid about the rules. I remember saying to John, "I'm surprised you came". His response was "When you grow closer to God (*and also to the gates of heaven, I'm older you know*) you judge less and forgive everyone!"

P.A.D.S. SIGN-UP

Public Action to Deliver Shelter (P.A.D.S.) is a collaborative ministry that involves non-profit organizations and churches in an effort to provide shelter and assistance of other needs to the homeless. At the local parish level, this ministry usually consists of one or more of the following efforts:

- Providing a site facility for overnight shelter.
- Providing dinner for each of the homeless guests.
- Providing bedding for overnight rest.
- Providing laundry services for the guests.
- Providing shower facilities for the guests.
- Providing a hot breakfast for the guests.
- Providing a carry-out bagged lunch for the guests.
- Optional provision of extra clothing and sundries.
- Optional provision of transportation vouchers.
- Optional provision of seasonal flu shots.

These are provided through the volunteer efforts of many churches and parishioners throughout DuPage County. At Divine Savior this support is provided by a team of volunteers that perform the following functions each of six Friday night/Saturday morning sessions:

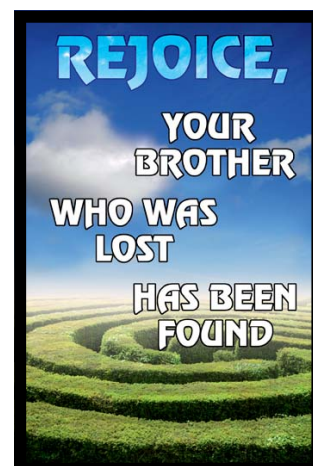
- Meal planning, shopping, dinner preparation at the Parish Center and dinner transportation to the P.A.D.S. site located at St. Mary of Gostyn Parish, Downers Grove.
- Set-up of the sleeping and dining areas at the site.
- Admitting and registration of the guests.
- Serving the prepared dinner to the guests.

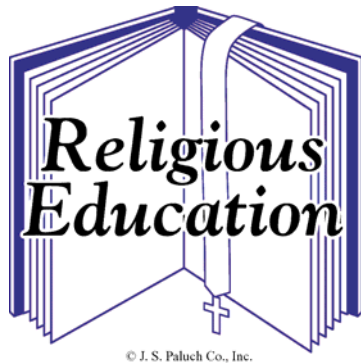
- Providing host services including guest laundry services.
- Monitoring the site after doors have been secured.
- Preparing the next day lunches.
- Preparing and serving the morning breakfasts.
- Clean-up of the facilities in the morning.
- Laundry of the linens, sheets & pillow cases for the next week's session.

This coming year, there will be a total of eight teams supporting this collaborative effort of St. Mary's and Divine Savior parishes enabling the site to remain open for eleven months. Sign ups of new volunteers for this important ministry will be held on September 11-12 in the church Narthex. There will be a PADS kick-off meeting for all team members on Monday, September 20 at 7:00 p.m. in the Pastoral Center.

R.C.I.A.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (commonly known as the R.C.I.A.) is a *journey* offered by our Parish with three main goals: faith exploration, faith conversion and faith enrichment. 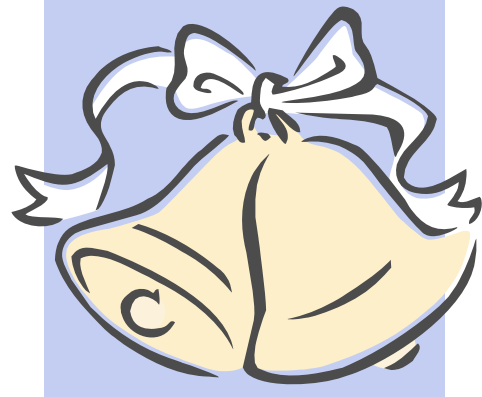
