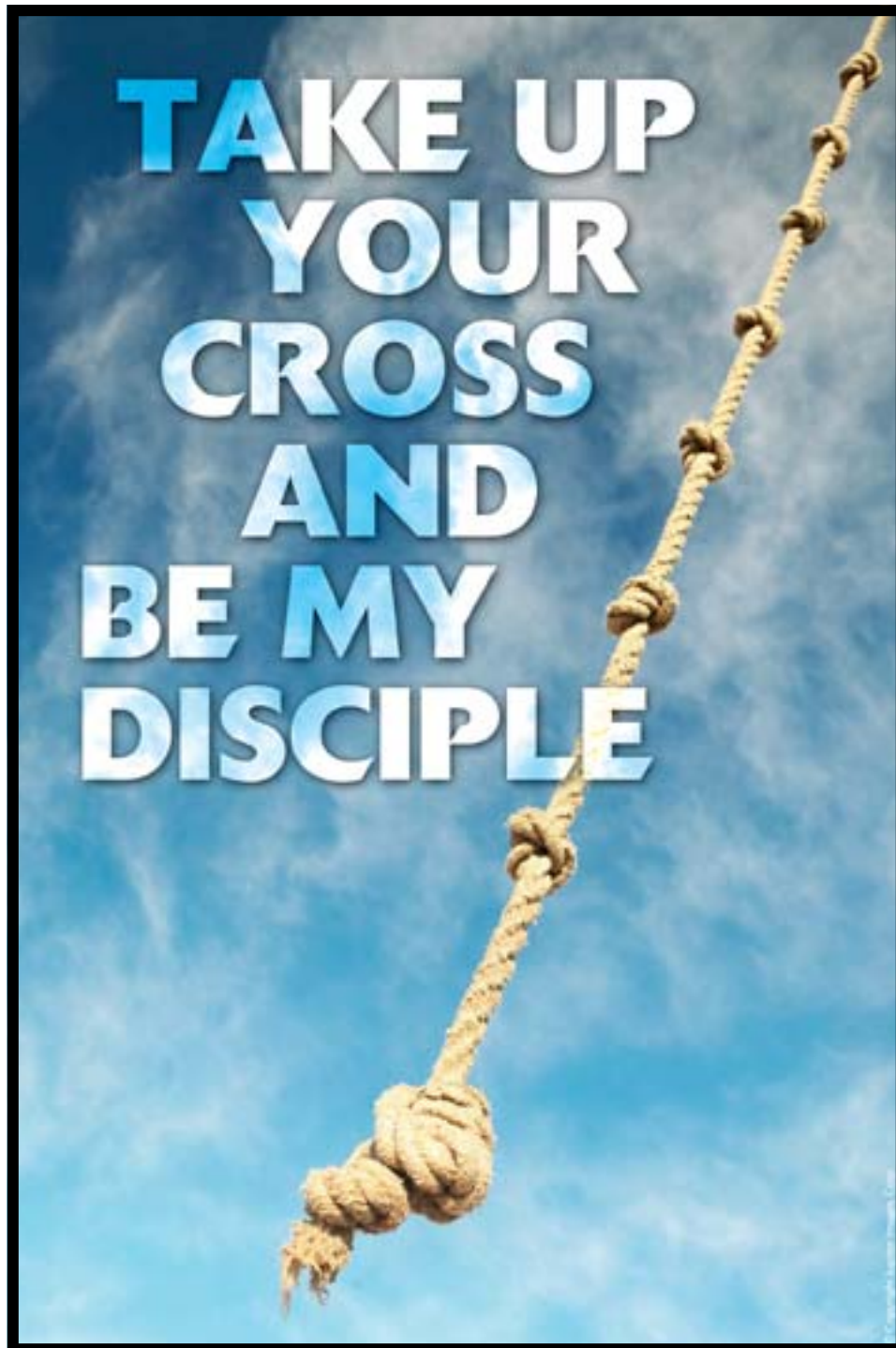

Reflections From the Pastor

*“The Church prefers the medicine of mercy
rather than that of severity.”*
- Blessed Pope XXIII

This past week I began reading Models of the Eucharist by Mons. Kevin Irwin. It is a book worth reading if one wishes a better understanding of the liturgy and especially of the Eucharist. Sometimes, I am convinced, God has a way of putting things in one's hands that correspond to what one is thinking and praying about.

At lunch one day I decided to put the book aside and look at the latest issue of *Commonweal* that had just arrived. It contained a wonderful article about the late Avery Dulles, S.J., theologian and cardinal, son of John Foster Dulles, secretary of state under Dwight Eisenhower. Cardinal Dulles was a convert to the Church, having been raised a good New England Presbyterian. He became an important Catholic theologian, respected by scholars both liberal and conservative.

The connection of the article to the book I am reading is Avery Dulles' classic, Models of the Church, that served as the inspiration for Kevin Irwin's book on the Eucharist. The genius of Avery Dulles, a man well schooled in history, was his ability to appreciate different perspectives on a given topic. Rather than an “*either/or*” approach to theological questions he embraced a “*both/and*” approach that sought to integrate different perspectives leading to a deeper understanding of the question.

Being a good student of Church history, Dulles began to see that in looking at the Church there was not one model, but several. None of the models were exclusive of the others, but pending on the historical moment one model perhaps received greater emphasis than others. For both Dulles and Irwin the danger is when one model becomes the only model. Some of the models of Church are the prophetic, the cultic, the institutional, etc. In total Dulles recognizes 10 different models. Turning to Mons. Irwin's book, he also presents 10 models for understanding the Eucharist, e.g., the Cosmic Mass, the Memorial of the Paschal Mystery, the Effective Word of God, etc.

One of the reasons I find both the work of Cardinal Dulles, S. J. and Mons. Irwin timely is that it would seem that for some in Church leadership the only model that matters is that of the institution. Recently I shared with others a talk given by Bishop Kevin Dowling of South Africa to a group of lay people. It is an extraordinarily candid assessment of what he sees happening in the Church today. What I found interesting was the number of folks with whom I shared the article who asked me if Rome would punish the Bishop for his candor. That caused me to do some soul searching as to why folks would ask such a question.

The answer for me is that too many, bishops and others, are into the church as institutional model and the cultic model to the exclusion of others. Presently U. S. Religious women are undergoing not just one, but two investigations by Rome. The Congregation for Religious Life and now Cardinal Leveda who took the place of Cardinal Ratzinger are busy investigating women religious. At the same time, it would appear that the U. S. Bishops are silent. Why? A quick read of American Church history reveals how much women religious have not only done but sacrificed for the good of the Church.

Somehow I think the church needs to consider the words of the good Pope John: “*listen to everything, forget much, correct a little. Unity in necessary things, freedom in doubtful things, charity in all things*”.

La semana pasada comencé la lectura de Los Modelos Eucaristía por monte de Venus. Kenin Irwin. Es un libro que vale la pena leer si se quiere una mejor comprensión de la liturgia y especialmente de la Eucaristía. A veces, estoy convencido, Dios tiene una manera de poner las cosas en las manos que corresponden a lo que uno está pensando y orando.

En el almuerzo un día decide poner a un lado el libro y mirar las mas resientes cuestiones de Commonweal que acababa de llegar. Contenía un maravilloso artículo reciente de Avery Dulles finales de los años, SJ, teólogo y cardenal, hijo de John Foster Dulles, secretario de Estado bajo Dwight Eisenhower. Cardenal Dulles era un converso a la iglesia, de haber sido levantado un buen presbiteriano de Nueva Inglaterra. Se convirtió en un importante teólogo católico, respetado por los eruditos, tanto liberales como conservadores.

La conexión del artículo con el libro que estoy leyendo es Avery Dulles clásico, Modelos de la Iglesia, que sirvió de inspiración para el libro de Kevin Irwin en la Eucaristía. El genio de Avery Dulles, un hombre bien instruido en la historia, fue su capacidad de apreciar diferentes perspectivas sobre un tema determinado. En lugar de un "esto/o" enfoque de las preguntas teológicas abrazó "ambos / y" enfoque que trata de integrar las diferentes perspectivas que conducen a una comprensión más profunda de las preguntas.

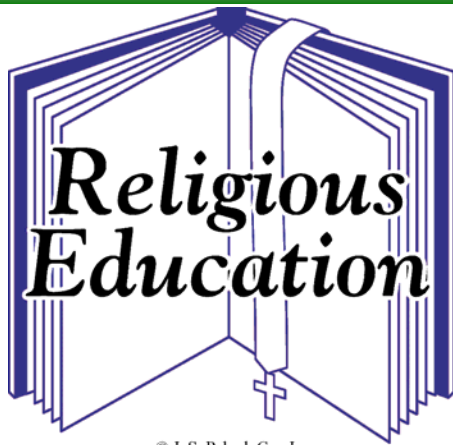
Siendo un buen estudiante de historia de la Iglesia, Dulles comenzó a ver que al mirar en la iglesia no había un solo modelo, sino varios. Ninguno de los modelos eran exclusivos de los demás, pero a la espera del momento histórico un modelo tal vez se llevara un mayor énfasis que otros. Por tanto Dulle e Irwin el peligro es cuando un modelo se convierte en el único modelo. Algunos de los modelos de la Iglesia son los profética, cultural, el institucional, etc En total Dulles reconoce 10 modelos diferentes. En cuanto a Mons. libro de Irwin, también presenta 10 modelos para la comprensión de la Eucaristía, por ejemplo, la masa cósmica, el memorial del misterio pascual, la Palabra eficaz de Dios, etc.

Una de las razones por las que encuentro tanto en el labor del Cardenal Dulles, SJ y Mons. Irwin oportunas es que parece que para algunos líderes de la Iglesia en el único modelo que importa es el de la institución. Recientemente he compartido con otros de una conferencia pronunciada por el obispo Kevin Dowling de Sudáfrica a un grupo de laicos. Es una evaluación extraordinariamente sincero de lo que ve sucediendo en la Iglesia de hoy. Lo que encontré interesante fue el número de gente con quien compartí el artículo que me pidió si Roma sería castigar al obispo por su franqueza. Eso me llevó a hacer examen de conciencia de por qué la gente tendría semejante pregunta.

La respuesta para mí es que demasiados, obispos y otros, están en la iglesia como modelo institucional y el modelo de culto a la exclusión de los demás. En la actualidad EE.UU. las religiosas no se encuentran a sólo una, sino dos investigaciones por Roma. La Congregación para la Vida Religiosa y ahora cardenal Leveda quien tomó el lugar del cardenal Ratzinger están ocupados investigando las religiosas. Al mismo tiempo, parece que los obispos de EE.UU. están en silencio. ¿Por qué? Una lectura rápida de la historia de la Iglesia estadounidense revela cómo las mujeres religiosas tienen mucho por hacer y le no sólo sacrificado por el bien de la Iglesia.

De alguna manera creo que la iglesia debe tener en cuenta las palabras del buen Papa Juan: "Escucho de todo, olvidar mucho, corregir un poco. Unidad en lo necesario, libertad en lo dudoso, caridad en todas las cosas."

P.A.D.S. SIGN-UP

Public Action to Deliver Shelter (P.A.D.S.) is a collaborative ministry that involves non-profit organizations and churches in an effort to provide shelter and assistance of other needs to the homeless. At the local parish level, this ministry usually consists of one or more of the following efforts:

- Providing a site facility for overnight shelter.
- Providing dinner for each of the homeless guests.
- Providing bedding for overnight rest.
- Providing laundry services for the guests.
- Providing shower facilities for the guests.
- Providing a hot breakfast for the guests.
- Providing a carry-out bagged lunch for the guests.
- Optional provision of extra clothing and sundries.
- Optional provision of transportation vouchers.
- Optional provision of seasonal flu shots.

These are provided through the volunteer efforts of many churches and parishioners throughout DuPage County. At Divine Savior this support is provided by a team of volunteers that perform the following functions each of six Friday night/Saturday morning sessions:

- Meal planning, shopping, dinner preparation at the Parish Center and dinner transportation to the P.A.D.S. site located at St. Mary of Gostyn Parish, Downers Grove.
- Set-up of the sleeping and dining areas at the site.
- Admitting and registration of the guests.
- Serving the prepared dinner to the guests.

- Providing host services including guest laundry services.
- Monitoring the site after doors have been secured.
- Preparing the next day lunches.
- Preparing and serving the morning breakfasts.
- Clean-up of the facilities in the morning.
- Laundry of the linens, sheets & pillow cases for the next week's session.

This coming year, there will be a total of eight teams supporting this collaborative effort of St. Mary's and Divine Savior parishes enabling the site to remain open for eleven months. Sign ups of new volunteers for this important ministry will be held on September 4-5 and September 11-12 in the church Narthex.

R.C.I.A.

A New “Social Contract” for Today’s “New Things”

Catholic Social Teaching

The Church faces the challenging task of bringing the light of the Gospel to these changing realities. In 1891, Pope Leo XIII issued what has become the *Magna Carta* of Catholic social teaching, *Rerum Novarum*, in which he dealt with the major shifts in production and new growth in productivity brought about by the Industrial Revolution that had seemingly moved the world into a new age.

Pope Leo addressed what he called the *res novae*, or “new things” of that time. European society was in many ways split into two ideological camps, one socialist, demanding collectivist organization with much governmental control and the other then called “liberal,” arguing that the entrepreneurs and those who owned the means of production should be free to develop markets with the most able, or ruthless, rising to prominence and wealth by whatever means they could find. Neither option seemed morally correct to the Pope.

The Holy Father insisted on the value and dignity of the worker as a human being endowed with rights and responsibilities. He commended free association or unions as legitimate and he insisted on a family wage that corresponded to the needs of the worker and family. He opened the way to humanize the industrial revolution and to bring Catholic principles about the person in society to factories and farms, markets and economies of a changing world.

That encyclical provided moral, and even spiritual, guidance for many of the great social reforms of the last century, including advances in public health, the banking system, public education, living wages, unions, and income security through the creation of Social Security, unemployment insurance, and similar programs. Then, as today, the Church was concerned about the balance between capital and labor, between owners and workers, when new technologies—whether steam engines, electricity, computers, or modern communications whatever it might be—disrupt that balance and put economic justice and the social contract up for re-negotiation.

Pope Benedict XVI confronts this same challenge directly and clearly in his most recent encyclical, *Caritas in Veritate*. More than 100 years of papal “social encyclicals” have given the Church a number of principles based on the Gospels and the lived experience of the Church. These principles and experience are now an integral part of Church teaching that have built on Pope Leo’s encyclical with both continuity and new insights. To all these Pope Benedict has added a new theological vision expressed by the very title of his letter: *Caritas in Veritate*, or *Charity in Truth*.

One of the principal “new things” addressed by Pope Benedict is globalization. Like Pope Paul VI before him, Pope Benedict uses the centrality of integral human development as one of the basic criteria to address the challenges of an interdependent world. Here the economic realities of one nation or one society are constantly being influenced by some or all of the economies and cultures of the rest of the world.

As a Church with a long tradition of bringing the light of the Gospel to the concrete social, economic, political, and cultural questions of the day, Pope Benedict reminds us this Labor Day that we as a nation and people do not live in isolation, we influence and are influenced by our brothers and sisters in all the nations, economies, and cultures that make up this globalized world. More than ever, the dignity of the worker is a foundation upon which we should measure much of what is good, and not so good, in the financial, industrial, and service sectors of our economy and our world.

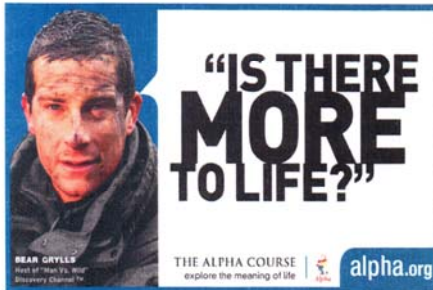

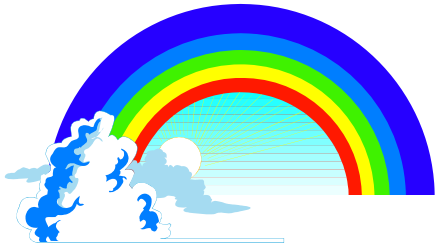

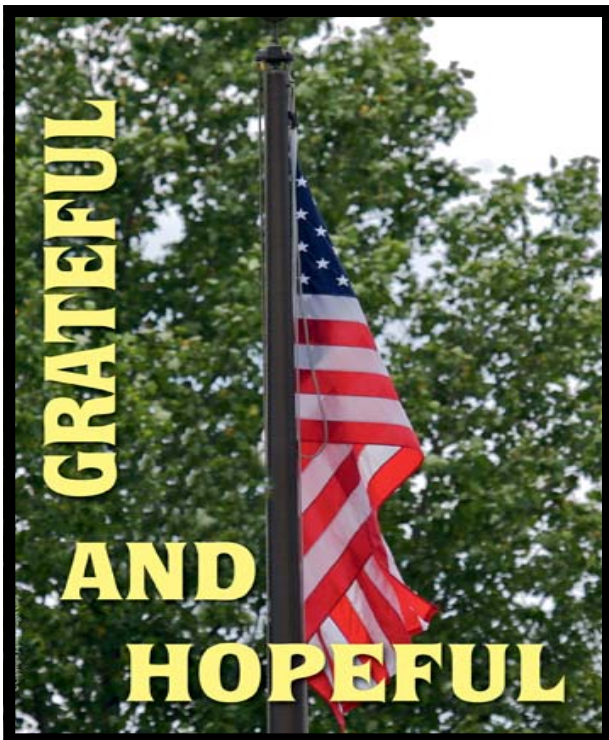
DIVINE SAVIOR'S LAY APOSTLE PRAYER GROUP

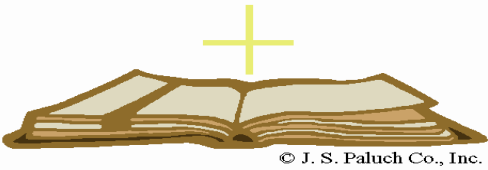
